Controversial Holocaust Skeptic Germar Rudolf Delivers Provocative Lecture Series at Libertarian Festival in NH's North Country

Lancaster, NH — German-born scholar Germar Rudolf captured attention at the Free State Project's 22nd annual "Porcupine Freedom Festival" (PorcFest), held June 16–22 at Roger's Campground. A central figure in forensic historical research, Rudolf presented a series of lectures challenging mainstream narratives about the Holocaust.

Rudolf's sessions took place on June 18th, 19th, and 21st at the festival's Firesteel canopy.

In his first highly anticipated session, "Censorship Leads to War & Genocide- Only Open Debate Can Bring Peace" Rudolf delivered his thesis that Holocaust historiography has silenced alternative forensic analyses. His approach involves presenting archival data, eyewitness testimonies, and detailed chemical-analytical finding materials he argues have been systematically discounted in mainstream discourse. Based on his forensic results, Germar concluded that mass gassings cannot have happened at Auschwitz and other camps as commonly claimed.

In his second lecture, "Censorship in the Western World – Threats to the Free Marketplace of Ideas", he spoke on the criminalization of historical dissent and the implications for academic freedom, drawing on his personal experiences—most notably, his criminal conviction in Germany for presenting forensic research that disputed mass-gassing narratives. He also recounted the revocation of his doctorate after being prosecuted under Germany's "Hitler law."

The final act at Porcfest was a showing of the documentary "Stalin's Judge: Andre Vyshinsky tells us about the Holocaust, Freedom, & Austrian Economics" followed by Q&A with Rudolf.

Each session drew robust crowds and sparked spirited Q&A dialogues, aligning with PorcFest's ethos of free expression and open debate. Germar Rudolf's participation marked one of the event's more polarizing contributions this year—prompting both support and controversy within the liberty-minded New Hampshire community.

"I was surprised by the interest and even enthusiasm with which my presentations were received," Rudolf said. "My messages noticeably fell on fertile soil: Jews did not create the prevailing flawed Holocaust narrative (others did), and for the sake of peace, we need to use history to educate rather than traumatize people. I'll be back next year with more messages for peace and understanding."

About Germar Rudolf

Rudolf is a German forensic chemist and historian who earned notoriety for his early-1990s reports on Auschwitz. Germar was working on his PhD in 1991 at the Max Planck institute for Solid-State Research in Stuttgart, Germany, when he was hired by a law firm to conduct forensic research on Auschwitz. His findings contradicted conventional accounts of mass-gassing events, leading to legal prosecution in Germany in the mid-1990s. He later relocated to the U.S., obtained political asylum, and continued publishing revisionist research. He was deported back to Germany in 2005.
